Chennai: Traffic on busy Kamarajar Salai (Marina Beach Road) was thrown out of gear on Thursday morning after a tiff between an MTC bus driver and an autorickshaw driver turned violent. Traffic resumed after half-an-hour. The autorickshaw driver: arrested on assault charges, was later let off on bail.

Around 9.45am, Subbaraian, 45, driver of the bus going to Parrys from Tiruporur, annoyed that an autorickshaw was refusing to give him way, forced it on to a platform near Presidency College. Autorickshaw driver Rajasekar 25, of Oorur Kuppam near Besant Nagar, chased the bus and abused Subbarajan.

Subbarajan slapped Rajasekar and the latter retaliated. The former sat on the road and blocked traffic and other MTC drivers and conductors joined in. They parked their buses haphazardly on the road, forcing traffic to a halt.

Police soon rushed there and pacified the MTC staff.

More dustbins in suburbs

Chennai: Overflowing garbage bins in the city will soon be history — the corporation council has approved ₹4.36 crore for conservancy work in the newly-added wards of Greater Chennai.

On Thursday the council approved purchase of nine hydraulic excavators, 75 compactors, 32 mechanical sweepers and 2,807 compactor bins. Mayor Saidai Duraisamy said that the new company will be asked to recruit workers employed by Neel Metal Fanalca whose contract is coming to an end. TNN
